Manager Message

Sunday, September 9 is the Fire Department's Annual Car Cruise and Corn Roast. As in years past, Irvine Street and Monongahela Avenue from Washington to Church Street will be closed from about 2 p.m. until 8 p.m. during the event. Proceeds will benefit the Volunteer Fire Department and the Police K-9 Fund.

The Borough has taken delivery and placed into service three new police vehicles and one dump truck for Public Works.

Back in 2016 and 2017, the Borough received nearly \$1.2 million in TAP Grants for the Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Upgrade Projects for the entire length of South Braddock Avenue in the Borough. The project is funded and managed by PennDOT. We have been informed that the project should finally be bid this fall with an earliest start date being March 1, 2019. Because the project is managed by PennDOT, the Borough does not have control over the project timetable.

The Borough will be working to begin Phase 2B and 2C of the Washington/Noble Streetscape project. This project will include the installation of 18 more decorative light posts and 18 trees on Washington and Noble Streets. The project is expected to cost around \$225,000. We have received \$141,600 in grant funding towards Phase 2B and 2C.

Late summer and early fall continues to be a busy time of year for the Department of Public Works. Road repairs are continuing, storm and sanitary sewer repairs are being made, crosswalks are being repainted, grass is being cut at all borough facilities and over 120 vacant properties, parks are cleaned and maintained, nuisance animals removed and a host of other projects are being completed.

Public Works employees have been repairing brick roads, primarily in the Regent Square area. These roads were installed over 100 years ago and have never had any major repairs performed. Many of these roads have developed depressions along the curb line which causes a steep drop off when stepping off the curb and makes it difficult to open car doors. The DPW and subcontractor Alex Bobick have been systematically removing bricks, cleaning each one, removing moist dirt and clay under the bricks, installing a new stone base and reinstalling the bricks by hand. This tedious work will continue for the foreseeable future.

The intersection of South Braddock Avenue and Sanders Street will soon have a new look. A. Folino Construction will be mobilizing to upgrade the safety features for pedestrians at this intersection. They will be installing a Rapid Rectangular Flashing Beacon Signal to warn motorists when there are pedestrians in the crosswalks and three bump-outs on South Braddock Avenue to shorten the crossing distance and prohibit passing when a vehicle is turning left onto Sanders Street. These important safety upgrades are taking place as a joint project between Swissvale and Edgewood Boroughs and is jointly funded through each borough along with a grant from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which was procured through the efforts of Representative Paul Costa and Senator Jay Costa.



GRILLING SAFETY TIPS

Fire in the grill, under hot dogs and hamburgers, is a welcome sight at the family cookout. But fire anywhere else can make your barbecue memorable for all the wrong reasons.

To keep you and your family safe while grilling, follow these guidelines:

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- Grills should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays. By the middle of the summer season, this is the cause of most grill related fires.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

OPEN BURNING

Open Burning is prohibited by Allegheny County Health Department regulations. However, small recreational fires in fire pits and chimineas are permissible. With the fall season approaching, many people find enjoyment in sitting around small outdoor fires. Please follow these rules for recreational burning:

- Fires must be contained to an area no larger than 3 feet wide by 3 feet long and no more than 2 feet high.
- Only burn clean, dry wood – never burn garbage, debris or yard waste such as leaves.
- Keep the fire at least 15 feet away from the nearest structure, inhabited area, roadway or property line. Under some circumstances, the distance may have to be greater to prevent smoke and odor emissions from creating a public nuisance.
- Tend the fire at all times. Never leave a fire unattended!

The fire department receives numerous calls in the fall for smoke investigations. While we respond to determine the origin of this smoke, we generally allow residents to enjoy themselves and their outdoor fires as long as it does not create a nuisance for surrounding property owners.


REMINDER TO LOCK YOUR VEHICLE

Locking your vehicle when parked is the single most effective way to deter theft of items inside. Thieves who steal from vehicles typically do so when they discover an easy opportunity. Police are on the lookout for those randomly attempting to open car doors in your neighborhood and anyone seen going car to car and engaging in this type of behavior should be reported via 911 immediately!

Following these easy steps is the most effective, safest way to avoid becoming a victim of theft from your car:

1. Do not leave valuables in your car overnight. Visible merchandise, expensive electronics or currency left in plain view is irresistible to thieves.
2. Ensure anything of value that you DO leave in your car when parked is stored out of sight. Utilize your vehicle's storage compartments to conceal items of perceived value from sight.
3. Lock your car when you park. In the vast majority of theft from a vehicle cases, the victim left their door unlocked when the car was parked and unattended.

Modern vehicles are incredibly difficult to gain access to when they are locked and breaking windows makes noise which draws attention. Thieves do not wish to draw attention to themselves, so when they encounter a locked vehicle door they will typically move on in search of an easier target. Don't become a victim! Remember to store valuables inside, out of sight and to keep your car locked at all times when left parked unattended.



SHARING THE ROAD SAFELY WITH SCHOOL BUSES

Students are heading back to school, which means school buses are traveling the streets once again. The reality of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside the bus than inside as passengers. Most children injured in bus-related crashes are pedestrians, 4 to 7 years old, who are hit by the bus or by motorists illegally passing a stopped school bus. For this reason, it is vital to know the proper procedures for sharing the road safely with school buses.

Motorists must stop at least 10 feet away from school buses that have their red lights flashing and stop arm extended. Do not proceed until all children have reached a place of safety and the bus has turned off their flashing lights. Never pass a school bus on the right or when it is stopped. The penalties if convicted of violating Pennsylvania's School Bus Law include a \$250 fine, five points on your driving record and a 60-day license suspension.

WHERE DOES ALL THAT TRASH GO, ANYWAY?

Litter doesn't just disappear; it can enter storm water drains and make its way to our waterways.

This is the perfect time of the year for folks to be outside spending time enjoying the nice weather. Unfortunately, those cookouts, picnics and other outdoor activities can lead to pop cans, water bottles, wrappers, and other trash being left outside. This litter is not only unsightly for our neighborhoods, it is also bad for our waterways. Every time it rains or snows, trash & debris from the upper watershed communities of Pittsburgh, Edgewood, Wilkinsburg and Swissvale wash into Nine Mile Run.

Trash in the stream causes pollution, further degrading the water quality that is also affected by sewage contamination, storm water runoff, and industrial waste. Over a decade after the Nine Mile Run Aquatic Ecosystem Restoration the stream is still not safe to fish in, play in, or even walk through. The trash also makes the stream an inhabitable environment for the fish and other wildlife that depend on the entire stream ecosystem for their survival, threatening the ecosystem that the restoration worked so hard to improve.

The solution to this problem is people picking up trash, piece by piece. Throughout the year Nine Mile Run Watershed Association staff and volunteers go on stream sweeps to remove large amounts of trash from the stream. During our Spring Stream Sweep 40 volunteers removed 72 bags of trash from the restoration area. Volunteers from Google and Key Bank picked up another 53 bags earlier this summer, but even with these efforts there is much more to be done.



It's not all picking up bottles and plastic bags. Some of the more entertaining finds include an electronic monitoring bracelet, toy baby bottles, troll dolls and more. If it's dropped on the street somewhere in the watershed, it could end up in Nine Mile Run, so you never know what you might find!

Come to our next Stream Sweep on October 6 to help make Nine Mile Run stream a cleaner, healthier place both for the animals who call it home and the people who love to visit!

WATERSHED PROTECTION: WHAT WE CAN ALL DO TO HELP

In Pittsburgh there is a lot of water, but rivers make up just 0.0001% of Earth's water. Water is a precious resource that we need to work together to protect, conserve and preserve. In Swissvale, we live in the Nine Mile Run watershed. A watershed is an area of land that drains into the same body of water. The way that we live on the land has a big impact on the quality of water in our rivers and streams.

Litter is found in almost every waterway. Eventually, much of it reaches our oceans and finds its way to one of the 5 huge "garbage patches." These gyres of garbage are larger than the State of Texas. It is said that a garbage truck's worth of trash is dumped into our precious oceans every minute! That amounts to approximately 1.4 **billion** pounds of trash per year.

Rain and snow that fall onto a watershed can flow across the surface or soak into the soil. As it passes over impervious surfaces (driveways, roads, rooftops, and tight monoculture lawns) it picks up all types of pollutants and carries them to our waterways.

Here are a few things that we can all do in and around the home to alleviate some of the water pollution and stormwater management problems that we experience in the Three Rivers area.

- Reduce your use of chemical fertilizer and pesticides! **NEVER use pesticides if it looks like rain!** Use compost and natural fertilizer, insect and weed repellents. Use mulch to keep weeds in check.
- Monitor your car for leaks and clean up oil spills, gasoline and other automotive fluids with kitty litter or another absorbent material. Never hose spills down the driveway or street. Recycle used motor oil and oil filters.
- Clean up after pets and dispose of waste properly – either in the trash or by composting.
- Go green and clean by using non-toxic, earth-friendly cleaning and personal care products. Take unwanted household chemicals to a Household Chemical Collection event, listed at <http://prc.org/programs/collection-events/household-chemicals/>
- Dispose of unwanted medication by returning it to your pharmacy or taking it your local drop-off location. Never flush it!
- Wear natural fabrics as much as possible, wash your clothes a little less and use a clothing bag to trap microplastic particles when you wash clothes. Ditch the microbeads and ban plastic bags in your life.
- Buy fresh, buy local whenever possible. Support our local growers by shopping at farmers' markets or by joining a CSA.
- Organize a neighborhood litter pick-up or join SEDCO's monthly event.
- Keep your cigarette butts off the street as they are the most commonly littered item and each one carries with it approximately 80 toxic chemicals.
- Don't leave fishing line behind as fish, birds and mammals can become tangled and can't free themselves.
- Pennsylvanians have the option of buying affordable fossil-free energy generated from renewable sources such as wind and solar.
- Consider a rain barrel and rain garden.

Remember the 3 R's; **REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE!** Go green. It starts with consumption. It starts with each of us. Think before purchasing.

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



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
